

BACKGROUND

A review of the reports filed by the Committee For Change ("the Committee") by the Reports Analysis Division revealed that the Committee may have incorrectly reported independent expenditures totalling \$1,900.50 it made on behalf of four federal candidates. In response to RAD's contact the Committee amended its reports to reflect the activity as independent expenditures and enclosed a copy of the pamphlet which was purported to be the "sole product of the Committee."

Subsequently, the Reports Analysis Division sent a request for additional information requesting that the independent expenditure report have a notarized certification and noting that the submitted pamphlet did not have a disclaimer as required by 2 U.S.C. § 441d.

Carl Curtis, attorney for the Committee, responded to the request for additional information stating the pamphlet previously submitted was not the one distributed during the campaign but may have been a printer's trial run. He further stated that the pamphlet which was distributed had a disclaimer on the last inside page. Additionally, he submitted a copy of the pamphlet which included the disclaimer.

The Reports Analysis Division referred this information to the Office of the General Counsel alleging that the Committee failed to clearly and conspicuously provide a disclaimer in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 441d.

FACTUAL BASIS AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

From the information forwarded to the Office of the General Counsel, it appeared that the Committee by placing the disclaimer on the last page of the pamphlet violated 2 U.S.C. §441d(a).

Section 441d(a) of the Act as amended in 1976 required a communication, not authorized by a candidate, his authorized committees, or their agents, to clearly and conspicuously, state that the communication is not authorized by any candidate. Additionally, 11 C.F.R. § 109.4(2)(i) which pertained to the Act as amended in 1976 defines "clearly and conspicuously as meaning on the face or front page of printed matter." The Committee's pamphlet did not have a disclaimer on the front or face page; the disclaimer appeared on the last page of the nine page pamphlet. Therefore, the Office of the General Counsel recommended finding reason to believe that a violation of the Act has been committed. However as the disclaimer on the Committee's pamphlet was in bold type and on the page where the candidates' names were listed, the Office of the General Counsel further recommended taking no further action and closing the file.

Also, the Office of General Counsel notes that Public Law 97-187 amended the language of 2 U.S.C. § 441d to read that any communication, expressly advocating the election of a clearly identified candidate "if not authorized by a candidate, an authorized political committee of a candidate, or its agents, shall clearly state the name of the person who paid for the communication and state that the communication is not authorized by any candidate or candidate's committee." The proposed draft regulations which pertain to this section require the disclaimer to "be presented in a clear and conspicuous manner" but does not require the disclaimer to be on the face or front page of printed material. 11 C.F.R. § 110.11 of the Proposed Draft Regulation dated February 28, 1980.

Based on the foregoing analysis, the Federal Election Commission:

1. Found reason to believe the Committee For Change violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d.
2. Determined to take no further action.
3. Closed the file.
4. Approved sending the attached letter and notification.

The proposed draft regulations which pertain to this section require the disclaimer to "be presented in a clear and conspicuous manner" but does not require the disclaimer to be on the face or front page of printed material. 11 C.F.R. § 110.11 of the Proposed Draft Regulations dated February 28, 1980.



No doubt your answer to all three of the questions on the cover of this pamphlet is "yes". That is almost the universal answer.

Everybody has complained about this, yet the government grows and grows with greater costs and more regulations with which we must comply. The budget in the last year of President Eisenhower's term was \$92 billion - today it is over \$500 billion! And, we are still faced with a deficit in excess of \$60 billion! Our people are taxed to the point where they cannot make ends meet.

Many good and conscientious public officials have gone to Washington hoping to effect some changes, but nothing seems to change. What is the answer? How do you bring about change?

In answering these questions we must bear in mind that the federal government cannot spend a dollar until it's authorized and appropriated by the Congress. Only Congress can pass a law. Every federal inspector or regulator who knocks on your door, and every form that you are required to fill out, comes about in pursuance to a law enacted by the Congress. Every costly and unreasonable regulation is made because it is authorized by a law passed by Congress.

How do we change Congress? Do you bring about changes in Congress by a mere change of faces? The answer is, not at all.

Do you bring about changes in Congress by retiring an experienced congressman or senator for a new one? Not at all. The real answer is, change the control of Congress.

Why do we need change in the control of Congress? The answer is that we've had one-party control of the Congress for nearly a half century. The Democrats gained control of the House of Representatives in 1930. In the next election they took control of both houses of Congress and have held it all these decades, with the exception of two brief periods of two years each.

What does "control" of Congress mean? The answer is, it means that the political party which elects the most members of the House or Senate takes control. For instance, at the present time there are 62 Democrat Senators and 38 Republicans. This means that the Democrats choose the President Pro Tempore, the Majority Leader and his assistants, and all chairmen of committees and subcommittees. The membership of the committees is in the same proportion as the Senate as

a whole. For instance, the Senate Committee on Appropriations has 16 Democrats and 9 Republicans. The party in control not only has the votes when the roll is called, but by having all chairmen and the leadership, they determine what legislation will be considered as well as the entire course that it takes.

The 62 Democrat Senators have created chairmanships and subcommittee chairmanships for 55 Democrat Senators. Many of these have staffs that are busy thinking of more laws to pass and more programs to promote.

How does the House of Representatives work? The system of control in the House works just like the Senate. For nearly half a century the Democrat party has been in almost continuous control.

One party or one clique can stay in control too long. This is true of a school board, a city hall, a county courthouse, or a state house. It is true to a greater extent of our federal government in Washington. This is why many loyal Democrat voters will vote to change control of Congress -because a prolonged lopsided, one-party control is not in the best interests of either the party or the country.

How then can the people get relief from the excesses of government? The answer is to change control of Congress. This means that if you want a change in Washington, the only way that you can bring it about is by voting for all the Republican candidates for the United State Senate and the United States House of Representatives. If the Republican party had been in control of the Congress for nearly a half century, a vote for Democrat control would be the vote for change. To vote for a change and end the one-party control is not a partisan matter; it is for the best interests of both parties.

If Nebraska votes to send an additional Democrat to the U.S. Senate, its citizens are voting against change; they are voting for a continuation of one-party control -- they are voting in favor of perpetuating the one-party control and making that control more lopsided than ever by having 63 Democrats to 37 Republicans.

Congresswoman Virginia Smith holds a very important place on the House Appropriations Committee. The election of a majority of Republican Congressmen would mean that Congresswoman Smith would be in line to be Chairman of a Subcommittee. She, working with new

leadership in the House, could effect some real changes toward the kind of government the people want. Were Nebraska to fail to re-elect Congresswoman Smith, it would be a vote against change. BACKGROUND

A review of the reports filed by the Committee For Change ("the Committee") by the Reports Analysis Division revealed that the Committee may have incorrectly reported independent expenditures totalling \$1,900.50 it made on behalf of four federal candidates. In response to RAD's contact the Committee amended its reports to reflect the activity as independent expenditures and enclosed a copy of the pamphlet which was purported to be the "sole product of the Committee."

Subsequently, the Reports Analysis Division sent a request for additional information requesting that the independent expenditure report have a notarized certification and noting that the submitted pamphlet did not have a disclaimer as required by 2 U.S.C. § 44ld.

Carl Curtis, attorney for the Committee, responded to the request for additional information stating the pamphlet previously submitted was not the one distributed during the campaign but may have been a printer's trial run. He further stated that the pamphlet which was distributed had a disclaimer on the last inside page. Additionally, he submitted a copy of the pamphlet which included the disclaimer.

The Reports Analysis Division referred this information to the Office of the General Counsel alleging that the Committee failed to clearly and conspicuously provide a disclaimer in violation of 2 U.S.C. § 44ld.

FACTUAL BASIS AND LEGAL ANALYSIS

From the information forwarded to the Office of the General Counsel, it appeared that the Committee by placing the disclaimer on the last page of the pamphlet violated 2 U.S.C. §44ld(a).

Section 441d(a) of the Act as amended in 1976 required a communication, not authorized by a candidate, his authorized committees, or their agents, to clearly and conspicuously, state that the communication is not authorized by any candidate. Additionally, 11 C.F.R. § 109.4(2)(i) which pertained to the Act as amended in 1976 defines "clearly and conspicuously as meaning on the face or front page of printed matter." The Committee's pamphlet did not have a disclaimer on the front or face page; the disclaimer appeared on the last page of the nine page pamphlet. Therefore, the Office of the General Counsel recommended finding reason to believe that a violation of the Act has been committed. However as the disclaimer on the Committee's pamphlet was in bold type and on the page where the candidates' names were listed, the Office of the General Counsel further recommended taking no further action and closing the file.

Also, the Office of General Counsel notes that Public Law 97-187 amended the language of 2 U.S.C. § 441d to read that any communication, expressly advocating the election of a clearly identified candidate "if not authorized by a candidate, an authorized political committee of a candidate, or its agents, shall clearly state the name of the person who paid for the communication and state that the communication is not authorized by any candidate or candidate's committee." The proposed draft regulations which pertain to this section require the disclaimer to "be presented in a clear and conspicuous manner" but does not require the disclaimer to be on the face or front page of printed material. 11 C.F.R. § 110.11 of the Proposed Draft Regulation dated February 28, 1980.

Based on the foregoing analysis, the Federal Election Commission:

1. Found reason to believe the Committee For Change violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d.
2. Determined to take no further action.
3. Closed the file.
4. Approved sending the attached letter and notification.

Why do we need change in the control of Congress? The answer is that we've had one-party control of the Congress for nearly a half century. What does "control" of Congress mean? The answer is, it means that the political party which elects the most members of the House or Senate takes control. One party or one clique can stay in control too long. This is true of a school board, a city hall, a county courthouse, or a state house. It is true to a greater extent of our federal government in Washington. This is why many loyal Democrat voters will vote to change control of Congress -because a prolonged lopsided, one-party control is not in the best interests of either the party or the country.

How then can the people get relief from the excesses of government? The answer is to change control of Congress. This means that if you want a change in Washington, the only way that you can bring it about is by voting for all the Republican candidates for the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives. If the Republican party had been in control of the Congress for nearly a half century, a vote for Democrat control would be the vote for change.
