Complaint against the ALCONA COUNTY  
REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE for violation of the  
Federal Election Campaign Act

MARK BREWER, who resides at: Clinton Township, MI  
48036, hereby files this Complaint against the ALCONA COUNTY REPUBLICAN  
COMMITTEE, a Michigan political party committee, whose mailing address is: P.O. Box  
19, Mikado, Michigan 48745, based upon the following:

1. Upon information and belief, the Alcona County Republican Committee purchased  
at least six (6) political advertisements for publication in the *Alcona County Review*,  
a weekly newspaper published in Harrisville, Michigan, on October 27, 2004, and  
possibly on other dates as well.
2. Typical of the advertisements, copies of which are attached hereto, was one that  
stated:

SECURE AMERICA

BUSH CHENEY

VOTE REPUBLICAN

Paid for with regulated funds by the Alcona County Republican  
Committee. Not authorized by an candidate or candidates  
commit- [sic]

Other ads contained the names, "Bush Cheney" as well as Don Hooper and Richard  
Fortier, who Republican candidates for Congress.

3. The advertisements were federal election activity as defined in the FECA.

4. Purchase of the advertisements by the Alcona County Republican Committee violated the FECA because it was a prohibited in-kind contribution by a state political party organization to the federal election campaigns of Bush/Cheney, Don Hooper and Richard Fortier. Such an in-kind contribution violated the FECA both because the Alcona County Republican Committee was not permitted to make in-kind contributions to federal candidates who had benefited from party coordinated expenditures by the Republican Party and because such contributions to publicly-financed candidates for President and Vice-President are prohibited.
  5. The advertisements also violated 2 U.S.C. § 441d(a)(3) because they did not state the address and telephone number or web address of the person who paid for them, as required under that Section.
  6. In addition, upon information and belief the expenditure for this advertisement has not been properly reported as required under the FECA.


Based on the foregoing, the Alcona County Republican Committee should be found to have violated the FECA and appropriate enforcement action should be taken accordingly.

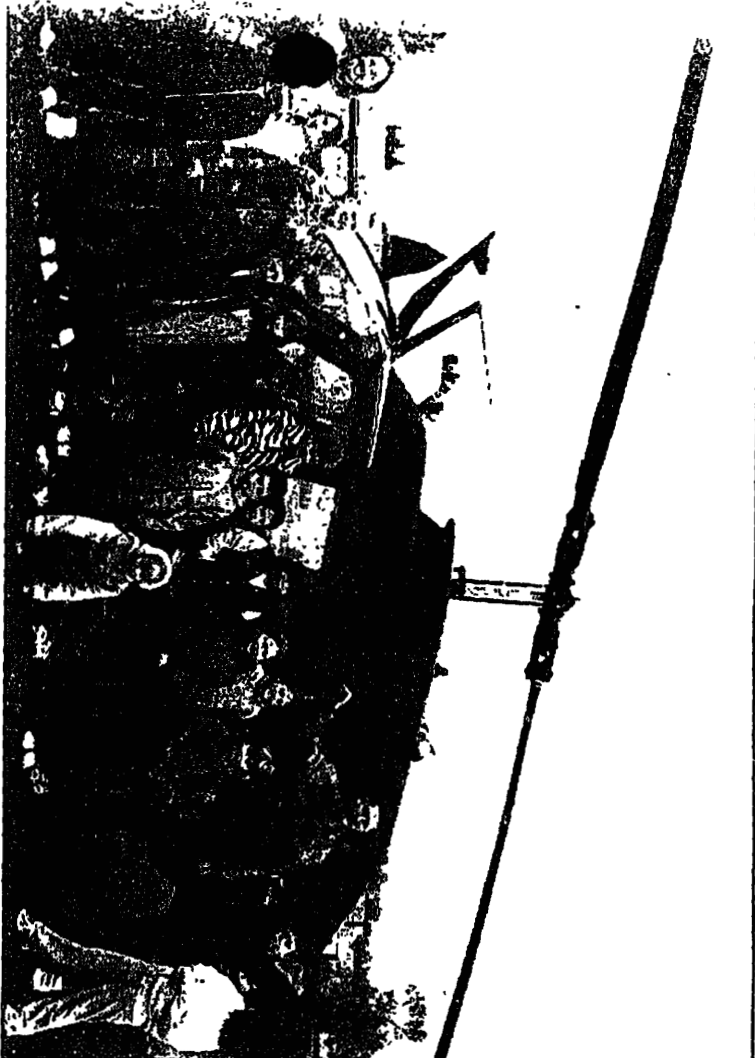

The wind was stirring the restless pines, the moon was stealing its sinister way through the broken clouds, and the scent of burning leaves was drifting through the dark, empty streets

There was no doubt about it.

To the delight of children everywhere, this magical time of year was upon us again. And as the ghostly shadows greeted another haunted night, I couldn't help thinking about my own bygone Halloween days, when we kids donned our ghastly apparel and sallied forth into the night doing our best to frighten the whole world into paying us tribute with a bounty of candy and other goodies. Of course, when I was a boy, I don't think I read the actual

Of course, when I was a kid, we did not necessarily restrict its practice to one night. If the mood came upon us, we would also go out begging on the night before Halloween and even two nights before. There was no set time for begging in those days.

Yes, we did dress up but the costumes were pretty much what you could throw together. There were very few store-bought, elaborate outfits in our social set. And it was quite a challenge to our little imaginations to come up with something original every year. Most of us stuck with the old standby: Cowboy outfits were popular as well as the old reliable ghostly sheets, with two holes for the eyes. I didn't like the sheet idea too much because the eye holes never seemed to be big enough, and I'd find myself stumbling around most of the evening.

I guess my favorite was the "burn" disguise, probably because it was so quick and easy. All a kid had to do was apply

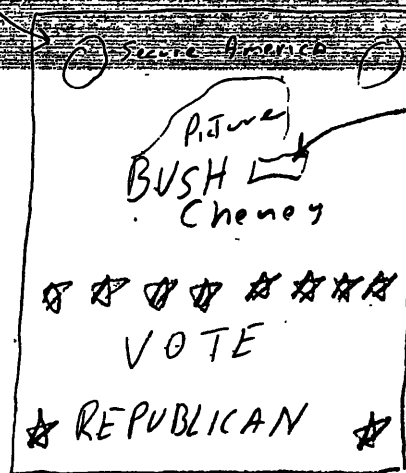
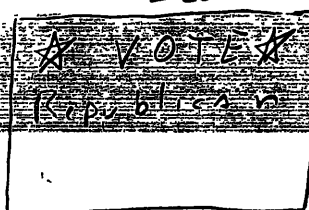

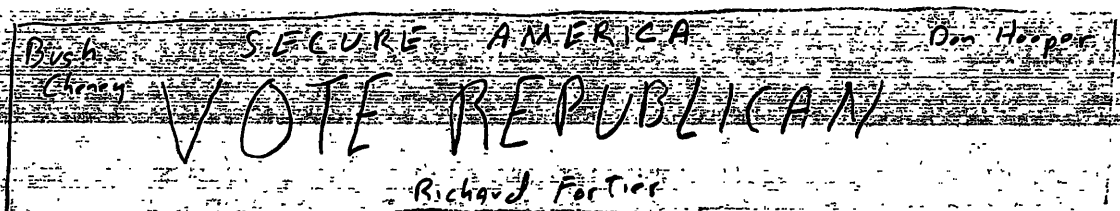
